### **The President**

uring my State of the University address, I "counted our blessings," and was overwhelmed by the goodness of God toward Belhaven and the scope of significant work we do. The list is amazing:

- We are in a category with only a handful of peer universities, delivering a sophisticated integration of orthodox Christian worldview teaching across the entire curriculum.
- We demonstrate respect and love for the students we serve, as we are guided by our desire to be as committed to Grace as we are to Truth.
- We are one of only 36 institutions nationally accredited in all four major arts. Our influence on the Arts in Christian higher education has been farreaching as many CCCU institutions have gone to emulate our success.

- We are well respected by our constituency and the public as a university that is serious about Christian faith, without being political or dogmatic in our message.
- Spiritual growth is incubated in Belhaven's residence hall bible studies, service ministry projects, offices, classrooms, and practice field conversations, as well as from RUF, FCA, and weekly chapel.
- We made it through three extremely tough, backbreaking academic years of COVID turmoil, and we are not only still standing, but we are still nice to each other.
- God placed us in a city that has some enormous challenges with its infrastructure and crime, plus a tarnished national reputation, but we are able to continue to grow and be safe in our Haven.
- While we are watching the rapid crumbling of several Christian universities across the nation, God has allowed us to remain on a firm financial foundation and in our Christ-centered mission.

All of Belhaven University's Enrollment Services are now in one facility. A team of more than 31 staff members all work together in a variety of ways to welcome and recruit students.


Before the move to the Jimmy Hood Welcome Center, Sullivan said the physical distance between the departments certainly had an impact on office camaraderie.

The Jimmy Hood Welcome Center is one of the newest additions to Belhaven's expanding campus. Located between Wilson Hall and the Center for the Arts, this renovated space will host firsttime visitors and is the new home for Belhaven's Office of Admission. The building is named in honor of Jimmy Hood, ('75) Belhaven University's Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

The University purchased the building from the Boy Scouts of America. "We went to the Boy Scouts of America several times to purchase their property," said Belhaven University President Dr. Roger Parrott. "At one point, we offered them over a million dollars for the building. The

property was very important to us, but they didn't want to sell. We worked on this four to five years and finally gave up on it."

Then unexpectedly, the chair of the Boy Scouts contacted Dr. Parrott. He had to sell the building, but only wanted to sell it to Belhaven University. The University bought it for the appraised value, which was \$438,000, compared to the over \$1 million that was offered several years before.

"The leadership at Boy Scouts was thrilled to sell it to us; they believe in our mission and are very supportive of us," Dr. Parrott added. "We put together a quick fundraising effort. In only four months, we raised \$1 million for the purchase and renovations."

Belhaven University board members, alumni, and others in the community believed in the project and generously gave financial support.

According to Dr. Parrott, it was a key purchase for the University. It freed up space on campus to house the Office of Student Development in the McCravey-Triplett Student Center. He added that this is the first time in nearly 20 years that the campus has had extra space. Dr. Parrott said, "This new building gives us continuous property on Riverside Drive, all the way up the street. It gives us a higher level of security because we own almost everything on that street and we can extend our security lights and cameras up Riverside Drive."

r. Timothy Quinn ('95) and his wife Melissa ('20, MBA '22) have generously donated funds to provide several new nursing mannequins to Belhaven University's School of Nursing. These lifelike patient simulators are set to improve the

training experience for nursing students, enabling them to engage in realistic scenarios that mirror the complexity of real-world medical care.

"The Quinns demonstrate their commitment to community health and healthcare needs through giving financially and giving of their time," said Dr. Johnnie Wijewardane, Belhaven's School of Nursing Dean. "Their recent donation of the

mannequins for our skills lab allows our School of Nursing to increase student capacity in our lab and provides students more opportunities for one-on-one time for skills practice and simulated clinical experiences. We are grateful for our partnership with the Quinns and their impact on improving the health of our community members and multiplying their impact through support of nursing education." Dr. Quinn is a board-certified physician in family

and weight loss medicine as well as the medical director of Quinn Healthcare, PLLC. His wife Melissa Quinn is chief operations officer. The Quinns, both alumni of Belhaven University, committed to funding the mannequins last fall.

The African-American nursing mannequins stand as a testament to the Quinns' commitment to fostering a diverse learning environment. Having raciallydiverse mannequins mirrors the cultural and ethnic diversity of actual patients in Mississippi as well as Belhaven's nursing students. This deliberate approach recognizes the importance of preparing future healthcare professionals to provide effective and empathetic care to patients from all walks of life.

These new mannequins will provide nursing students with a hands-on platform to practice a wide range of medical situations, such as resuscitation, blood pressure, defibrillation, full body CPR, and IV management. By introducing scenarios that encompass the diversity of patient experiences, the mannequins equip students with the skills and cultural competence necessary to provide positive patient-centered care.

SELECTS ALUMNA TO LEAD DIGITAL MARKETING

Brianna McElroy's VOYAGE INTO SHAPING HOLLYWOOD'S MOVIE MAGIC

loved watching movies growing up, "said Brianna McElroy ('11). She had her favorite movies and could quote her favorite lines from her favorite actors. Little did she know that one day she would be working alongside the same actors and directors she so admired as a child.

In February of this year, the Lionsgate Motion Picture Group named McElroy, a Jackson Mississippi native and Belhaven alumna, head of worldwide digital marketing. This lead role is crucial because her department is one of the main communication channels that promotes their upcoming movies.

While with Lionsgate, McElroy has led 360 digital campaigns for releases such as *John Wick: Chapter 4*, starring Keanu Reeves, and will lead upcoming releases including *The Hunger Games: The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes* and *Now* 

You See Me 3, to be directed by Ruben Fleischer. The Lionsgate film slate also includes Expendables 4; Ballerina, which expands the John Wick universe; and many more.

"I've always loved movies. I've always loved their creativity and storytelling. I was over the moon when I discovered this career. I get to have fun for my job. Are you kidding?"

McElroy works closely with directors, producers, and even actors. "It's awesome to meet actors that I've seen in movies growing up. They're obviously highly-creative and highly-motivated people, and that energy is contagious."

Now a part of the film industry, she not only realized the amount of effort that goes into making a movie, but also the work actors put in to promoting their movie. "I had to go on a promotional tour with a star once. My job was to be everywhere this person was and capture social media content. I remember looking at the schedule and seeing days start at 4:30 a.m.

and end at 10 p.m. The talent put a lot of time and energy into shooting the movie, but there is tremendous work that goes into the publicity and marketing of a film as well."

McElroy leads a large team that have various roles. "My team is comprised of social media, digital strategy, and creative asset leads," said McElroy. Her team is constantly listening to fans and monitoring social media to develop the best content possible to help market movies.

McElroy's job requires a good amount of multitasking. She is working on many films at different stages. "Even when a movie release is just a week or two away, we are simultaneously working on other campaigns. We might be preparing for a trailer launch for a different film that doesn't release for another year, or even planning on-set content capture for a movie that hasn't even gone into production. Honestly, there is work being done on every single movie at any given time."

When asked if she had a particular movie she was looking forward to, McElroy said she couldn't pick a favorite. "When working on these, you're working on a piece of art that someone has put their heart and soul into. It means the world to them, so it all means the world to me. We're being trusted with the care of these stories. It's a big privilege and responsibility."

Before her appointment as head of worldwide digital marketing, McElroy served as Twitter's global client lead in media and entertainment for over two years. While at Twitter, she oversaw partnerships with Warner Bros., Discovery, and The Walt Disney Company.

Before Twitter, she was director of digital marketing at Warner Bros. Pictures, driving digital marketing campaigns for Wonder Woman, Kong: Skull Island, Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them, Ocean's 8, A Star Is Born, and Pokémon Detective Pikachu.

Warner Bros. is one of the oldest studios in Hollywood, and this is where McElroy's career took-off, giving her valuable experience on

major motion pictures. McElroy added, "I loved every minute of it. It's where I would say I grew up in terms of my career. I learned so much."

For McElroy, her job is more than just promoting movies and advertising. She believes her job brings value beyond herself because she gets to help propel something that people can connect with.

"You know, the thing that I always go back to is that in dark times, and happy times, and in many ways, since the dawn of time, the thing that is consistent about humanity is our love of stories, I think for a lot of us, it's because they help us feel less alone. They help us laugh when we're down, or cry when we need

to. They are an essential part of the human experience, and to help share these stories with the world, well, it is a privilege."

"When I worked on *Wonder Woman*, the number of little girls who would come up to me dressed as little wonder women – wanting to be superheroes – it all moved me to tears. I think I cried throughout that whole campaign because I was so inspired."

According to McElroy, her career skills and knowledge were sharpened while studying at Belhaven University as a communications major. During her time on campus, her love for storytelling grew. "I remember one of the things I learned while at Belhaven was from a professor in my writing class. He said something along the lines of, 'Every story is interesting depending on how you tell it.' So for me, there is always a good story, and I admire and appreciate the storytellers for the magical work they do."

Her time at Belhaven was meaningful. She loved the way the curriculum connected. "When going through classes at Belhaven, everything you're learning is in sync with the topics you're studying in other classes. That ultimately deepened my curiosity in everything. It built a comprehensive view of the world as it is, as it was, and as it might be."

Now in a successful career for one of the world's most prominent studios, McElroy encourages current students with this advice. "It may feel like a risk and sometimes things don't work out, but take the risk and do the thing that is exciting and inspires you. Because there's a way to really love the work that you do."



## BELHAVEN UNVEILS NEW PARKING GARAGE: ENHANCING CONVENIENCE AND SECURITY

ne anonymous donor has made a significant impact to the campus through a \$12 million gift. The University's new parking garage, completed in August 2023, provides a convenient and practical solution to Belhaven's parking challenges. "I've been a university president for 33 years, and I never expected anyone to give money for a parking garage," Dr. Roger Parrott said. "It's pretty remarkable."

The landscape of the Blazer campus looks much different now than it did only three years ago. In a relatively short time, four major construction projects have marked a significant step in university history. The tallest of these projects can be seen from a distance. The five-story parking garage shares the Belhaven skies with other big campus buildings such as the McCravey-Triplett Student Center and University Village.

Parking has long been a challenge at Belhaven, due to steady growth in enrollment over the years. Dr. Parrott calls the garage "a game changer" for the campus. "It makes the best use of our land," he said. "We're a small campus, and we can't take up everything with parking. It gives us enough capacity to assure that we could build another residence hall and classroom building eventually."

The garage was constructed over the existing parking lot between Heidelberg Gymnasium and the Dr. Billy Kim International Center and in front of Lakeview Residence Hall. Access is from the two university entrances off Peachtree Street, with one entrance putting drivers at the lowest level of the garage and the other higher in the garage.

The garage's exterior, constructed with brick, harmonizes with the existing buildings on campus. Its design incorporates two below-grade stories, minimizing its visual impact from Peachtree Street, ensuring the garage's aesthetic integration with the campus.

Beyond its look, this new garage has an applied and practical use. With its central location, the garage provides students with improved access to their classes, residence halls, stadium events, cafeteria, and other essential campus facilities.

What sets this parking garage apart from conventional ones is the deliberate effort to create a distinct experience for its users. Belhaven's leadership recognized the importance of designing a garage that defied the typical perception of parking structures. Dr. Parrott explained, "It is filled with lots of light. Many garages feel scary, but this one is different. Equipped with security cameras and ample lighting, the garage will cater to residential students, faculty, staff, and commuters alike.

Barnes, a Jackson native, earned qualification in the 400 Meters after posting one of the Top 22 times in the nation during the outdoor season.

Barnes' qualifying time was 56.39 seconds which was the 15th best time in the nation and won her the event championship for the Collegiate Conference of the South.

At the meet, Barnes ran a 58.75 in Heat 1 and finished 7th among runners in her Heat. Overall, Barnes' time placed her 21st as she got her first opportunity to compete for a National Championship as a member of the Belhaven Track & Field program.





# Adjoins to Love

Nursing Major Meggan Mickle juggles family, faith, school, and career

The path to a career and calling can be simple for many. Some have clear direction, and some know their vocation at a young age. Meggan Mickle's ('22) path was full of ups and downs, but God has a way of using hardships to change

our trajectory in a good way.

Mickle is from Crystal Springs, Mississippi, and grew up in the foster care system. While Mickle knew her biological family and could take care of herself, she constantly saw other children struggle with shuffling from home to home. This lit a spark within her. She realized the need to help children and become a voice for those who did not have one. She might not have known how she was going to do it, but for Mickle, "this was it for me; I was going to change the world."

Mickle gained clarity on her purpose and that put significant pressure on her college choice. Her first significant step toward helping others was when she chose to become a police officer. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Jackson State University. "My plan was to start an outreach program

for underprivileged and foster care youth," said Mickle. "I thought I had it all figured out and began walking in my purpose."

Many know that life never goes the way we plan it. Mickle found herself pregnant with twins. "Excited and scared, I prayed for guidance because I thought my plans to become an officer and help people were gone."

A few months into her pregnancy, she would find out that her daughter would be born with Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome. "This was devasting. Not only was I not going to become an officer, but my daughter would be sick. However, it was the beginning of God's true purpose for me."

After the birth of her twins, Mickle spent the first three months praying over her daughter while she had multiple surgeries for her heart. During these surgeries, Mickle, a single mother, would live at the Ronald McDonald House on the campus of University of Mississippi Medical Center, caring for her twin son.

"The first two months were the hardest but, while there, something inside me was growing." Mickle observed, "Out of everyone that helped us at the hospital, I can only remember the names of our three nurses. They didn't just come and go. My daughter wasn't just another patient to them. They were the difference between me crying all night long and having the strength to take care of my children. They helped me persevere through this hard time."

After experiencing the loving service from these three nurses, Mickle made a life-changing decision at that moment. "Those bedside nurses gave me hope. I wanted to become one of those nurses and help as many people as I could. God had given me my path. It was at that moment I decided to become a nurse."

Through her journey with Belhaven's School of Nursing, Mickle showed her hard work and dedication to her studies. The Mississippi Nurses Foundation selected her as the recipient of the

2022 Oneita Dongieux Award for Excellence.

This award, established through the Mississippi Nurses Foundation, recognizes those who are excelling in their studies to become a nurse.

Only two Mississippi students are given this prestigious award every year. During her senior year at Belhaven, Mickle earned an internship in pediatrics at University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMMC). Nursing students from around the state

competed for this internship, and only a few are selected each summer.

As Mickle got closer to her goal of nursing, she reflected on her past and the many hardships she experienced. "God does not

make mistakes, and he gave me my children to lead me to my

purpose. I needed them, and my daughter is the reason I wanted to become a nurse."

Her dreams became a reality when she walked across the stage and held her diploma for the first time. Mickle is now a full-time registered nurse in UMMC's Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. Her daughter Madison received a heart transplant in November 2022, and "her health is good with all things considered," added Mickle.

Madison's doctors have even given her the "all clear" to visit Disney World in October of this year. The twins are now five years old and started kindergarten, and Mickle has also started her MBA at Belhaven.

Rick Negron, chair of Belhaven's Film Production Department, wrote and produced the feature film *Amigo*. Currently in post-production, this full-length film was shot in the summer of 2022 on location in Miami, Florida.



Directed by visual artist and filmmaker Luis Gispert, *Amigo* follows Tomás, a Latino immigrant

who works odd jobs for a wealthy family. A series of events forces Tomás to visit people in his community in search of something lost, but the journey reflects his own social and emotional limitations.

"Right now, Amigo is in post-production and is almost finished," said Negron. "Once it's complete, it will be entered in several film festivals."



#### OLIVIA HANEY PUBLISHES ARTICLE IN CHEMISTRY JOURNAL

The Journal of Physical Chemistry A has published the peer-reviewed research of junior chemistry major Olivia Haney.

"It is rare for an undergraduate student to get a published paper, even for larger research universities," said Chair and Associate Professor of Chemistry Dr. Brandon Magers. "Many of our chemistry students participate in internships, but Olivia being an author of a peer-reviewed research article, goes above and beyond. Her lab experience, conference participation, and now-published research will make Olivia a top pick for a job or placement into graduate school."

Dr. Ryan Fortenberry, associate professor of chemistry and



biochemistry at the University of Mississippi, was the lead researcher and advisor for this project. Haney worked under Fortenberry and his research team during the summer of 2022.

The research paper, "Red-Shifting the Excitation Energy of Carbonic Acid Clusters Via Nonminimum Structures," focused on carbonic acid. The molecule is difficult to study because it tends to break apart into water and carbon dioxide.

Scientists don't know much about carbonic acid, such as its structure or the shapes of clusters, but that changed a few years ago. A laboratory was able to freeze solid carbonic acid using super cold temperatures. At this temperature,

the atoms were stuck as carbonic acid and unable to break apart. The laboratory ran tests on how much light it could absorb but did not study the energy state of carbonic acid. That is where Fortenberry's team focused their efforts.

Haney said, "Using computational chemistry, I was able to generate potential shapes that this frozen

carbonic acid could take and what kind of excitation energies it would experience in these shapes." She would manually manipulate a carbonic acid molecule, such as rotating a bond and changing its angle, then code that rotation into her calculations. Haney would run multiple jobs where

"snapshots" of the molecule would be taken, and its energy would be recorded during its rotation.

"The geometric structure of a molecule is very important information because it tells us how it responds to itself, with other molecules, and with its environment," observed Haney. "This project helped us learn more about the potential geometric structure that carbonic acid is in nature, which is something that has barely been studied."

The Belhaven football team lives by the motto, 'To serve, not to be served.' Even so, they had no idea those words would mean so much to one little girl named Natalie Hughes.

Natalie is a sevenvear-old who grew up smiling, dancing, and loving everything pink until news from the doctors brought her life to a standstill. Natalie was

Natalie Hughes diagnosed with a rare blood condition called Aplastic Anemia, and began treatment, but little did she know it was only the beginning.

Her immune system attacked her bone marrow and made it stop working. After a year and a half of weaning off medication for the final step, the medication failed, and her immune system attacked her bone marrow again. Natalie needed a bone marrow transplant. They finally found one through a 100% donor match, but it still wasn't

enough to make the little girl feel completely normal.

Through the years, Natalie felt like she was just a kid who couldn't do the things she wanted. "The most difficult part was just not letting her be a kid," John Hughes, Natalie's father, said. "We can't risk her breaking something or getting fallen on or anything like that that could have internally made her bleed out."

All of these challenges were made a little easier when they realized they weren't alone in this journey; in fact,

they had an entire team behind them. Blaine McCorkle, head football coach at Belhaven, first learned about Natalie through Jon Brewer, one of his player's dads. He called the coach and mentioned that there

was a young girl from his

hometown who was sick and

struggling and needed some encouragement. That's when Coach McCorkle decided to take it to his team.

"He [Coach McCorkle] just kind of came to us and told us that there was a little girl with a rare form of anemia and that their family was going through a lot of hardships and stuff like that, and we want to do something to be able to just lessen something. We couldn't do a lot, but we wanted to do what we could," said Jeremiah Buenrostro, a senior football player majoring in nursing.

The team went to the Children's of Mississippi Hospital, where Natalie

was being treated, and surprised her. They wanted to make her feel loved and let her know that people cared for her. They showed up and were able to see her in her window. They did some backflips, made signs, wore their jerseys, and were happy to even get a smile from Natalie.

"To see our kids make her smile as a father meant a lot, and as a coach, it definitely made me proud," said Coach McCorkle.

Natalie's father said it was amazing to see them do that, and Natalie thought it was pretty impressive. Bogan Brewer, a junior football player said, "I remember she got into the window and just lit up, and I was like, 'That's why we're doing it. That's why we're doing it."

In that moment, Natalie became an official honorary member of the Belhaven football team. The team wanted to show Natalie that they were there for her, and it made all the difference. They brought joy and hope to a little girl's life, and it was a reminder that, sometimes, the smallest act of kindness can have the biggest impact.

"I've learned that God didn't just do this to me to say that I wasn't supposed to do things in life," Natalie said. "I've learned that he did it because I needed to learn in life that nothing's really easy. You have to climb. So many people have told me I can't do things that normal kids can do until this is over, and, like I mean, it felt like forever. Now it's getting cured, and I just feel happy about that."

ne Belhaven University alum is researching a new class of chemical material that could help fight climate change.

Since graduating with a chemistry degree from Belhaven University in 2015, Dr. Sixbert Muhoza continues his passion for research. He is now a research fellow at the Department of Energy's (DOE) Argonne National Laboratory and is studying a class of chemical materials which hold promise for use in green energy technologies.

"The overarching goal of my research work is to develop green energy generation and conversion devices to curb and/or reverse the effect of climate change," said Muhoza. This new class of materials called MXenes are twodimensional metal carbides and/ or nitrides with high electrical conductivity, among other properties. Muhoza and the team at Argonne are studying MXenes from three angles.

First, they are exploring how they can develop novel ones with tuned and customized composition and complexity. Second, they want to use them to make new and better electrodes for batteries. Third, they are studying how to use them to convert carbon dioxide into useful fuels.

Muhoza's research has important and practical applications. Since most renewable energy technologies use or rely on electrochemical principles, his research provides a significant contribution to the fight against the impact of climate change.

"My research spans a variety of topics on applying electrochemistry to develop environmentally-benign devices and technologies," noted Muhoza. "The applications include developing high-capacity batteries, conversion of carbon dioxide into fuels and chemicals, sensors for pollutants, and more."

According to Muhoza, developing high-capacity batteries is key to achieving wide adoption of electric vehicles and solar power, which will substantially reduce the release of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. "One angle to accomplish this is to develop energy devices that do not rely on fossil fuels. If we don't burn fossil fuels, we don't emit greenhouse gases, and, hence, undergo no unnatural changes in temperature/climate."

His work on carbon dioxide reduction provides another method to attack the same problem, but from the opposite end. He is researching ways the carbon dioxide already released in the atmosphere can be converted into useful chemicals such as ethanol or methane.

According to Muhoza, this type of research will have a wider impact on the scientific community as well. "Not only is that going to be beneficial for developing more efficient electrodes for batteries and electrolyzers, but it will also help guide the general scientific community on material development methods."

The trajectory of Muhoza's life took a turn after he graduated from high school in his home country of Rwanda (Africa). Initially, he wanted to go to medical school and had even been admitted into one there.

He thought and prayed over his life and career. Muhoza commented, "Being a doctor and treating people is very important, but I became more interested in work that would change how people lived. As I saw it, scientific innovation is the reason why people in this generation are living better than those in previous generations, and I wanted to contribute to that progress."

His confirmation came when he was awarded a presidential scholarship to come to the United States. He packed his bags and headed to Jackson, Mississippi.

The overarching goal of my research work is to develop green energy generation and conversion devices to curb and/or reverse the effect of climate change.

Belhaven University and its professors had a major impact on Muhoza and his decision toward research. "I had my first research project at Belhaven University with Dr. Gary Reid Bishop, and everything rolled out from there. It is thanks to my professors and classmates that I was able to pursue this path with enthusiasm."

Muhoza said that the support he received didn't stop at the chemistry department. He had much help from people in other departments as well. "I basically had an open invitation to the offices of Dr. John Estes (Chair of the Mathematics Department), Dr. Tracy Ford (Dean of Worldview Studies), Dr. Chip Mason (retired Dean of the Business School), to name a few. The guidance and advice they gave me have stayed with me to this day."

By the time he graduated, Muhoza had completed a variety of research projects with multiple professors, which was critical in securing his graduate school admission to Wake Forest University where he earned a Ph.D. in Materials Chemistry in 2019.

In 2018, Muhoza completed a graduate fellowship at the DOE's National Energy Technology Laboratory where he was first exposed to and picked interest in the work of national laboratories. He continues his research work at the Argonne National Laboratory. "I am excited to continue developing/researching these technologies and then see some of them turn into parts of industrial processes that impact our lives for the better."


