LETTER FROM

The President

In the 1940s, Hollywood Presbyterian offered a small discipleship group for promising young leaders. Over time, one of those members became the Chaplain of the United States Senate, another the pastor of National Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, and a third became pastor of the most influential church in California, where Ronald Reagan was an active member.

The fourth of these young leaders, Bill Bright, along with his wife Vonette, founded a ministry in 1951 called Campus Crusade for Christ, now called Cru, which became the largest evangelism ministry in the world, now with 30,000 staff working in 190 countries.

Bill and Vonette were wonderful mentors and influential friends to me. And when they launched The Jesus Film on a global scale in the late 1980s, Bill asked me to lead their campaign to raise \$2 billion to fund it, which was an unheard-of goal back then.

At the same time Bill was talking with me about that responsibility, I was contacted by a small Presbyterian college in central Kansas to be a candidate for their presidential search. I was only 34 and wondered who would want such a young and inexperienced president.

As MaryLou and I went through that decision process, I vividly remember standing with Bill on the lawn outside their retreat headquarters in Arrowhead Springs, California. Bill was pushing me to come with him to The Jesus Film, but he was also a mentor, so I needed his counsel about taking the Christian college presidency route.

Bill said that if you are driven by evangelism, what we do with The Jesus Film will be much bigger. On the other hand, if it is deep-level discipleship that drives you, it will be lots slower and probably take generations, but your Kingdom reach may go further in a college than here – if you stay committed to discipleship as your highest calling.



That was 37 years ago. Beginning at Sterling College, and now these 30 years at Belhaven, I've been privileged to team with faculty, coaches, administrators, and staff to create a robust learning environment committed to discipleship that has reach and impact I never imagined would be possible.

Today, Belhaven is going to the nations:

- Serving online masters and doctoral students in China.
- Offering hybrid graduate degrees for students from India working for major corporations in America.
- Equipping a record number of traditional campus and online students to become people of significant influence in the "nations" of the arts, education, health care, business, pastoral and missions ministry, public service, social work, counseling, athletics, law, technology, and engineering.

Here at Belhaven University God has called us to participate in the Great Commission by being both faithful and dependent on Him for the outcome. In this calling, I'm often reminded how true Bill Bright's words have proven over the years: the opportunities for discipleship in a college are deeply, humbly, thrillingly satisfying. I'm so thankful that at this corner of Peachtree and Pinehurst we are committed to long-haul Kingdom building, engaging in discipleship wherever and whenever God opens a door.

Go and make disciples of all the nations ... And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age.

Belhaven University is celebrating record enrollment this fall, with approximately 4,500 students enrolled across its traditional, online, and graduate programs. The growth marks a significant increase from 4,005 students in 2024 and continues a steady five-year trend of rising enrollment.

University President Dr. Roger Parrott, who has led Belhaven since 1995, noted that the numbers have not only rebounded from last year's dip but reached new heights in the institution's history.

"When I began as Belhaven's president 30 years ago, we had around 800 students," Parrott said. "Today, I'm overjoyed with the number of enrollment highs we

have reached because it represents our effectiveness in serving students with a quality, Christ-centered education. Our record growth reflects the strength of our academic programs, and the quality of our faculty, coaches, and staff. Belhaven's service-focused environment draws students from every background to this university."

This fall, Belhaven welcomed nearly 1,050 traditional undergraduate students, surpassing the 1,000 mark for the first time since 2018. In addition, the university enrolled approximately 625 online undergraduate students, and 2,600 students in online graduate and doctoral programs.

Since 2021, Belhaven's total enrollment has increased by 4%, while the freshman population has grown by 22%. Retention has also shown strong gains, with the university's retention rate rising 49% compared to last year.

Parrott noted that the university's efforts to strengthen both the arts and athletics have continued to shape the student experience, with growing numbers in the arts and an expected increase in students who are involved in neither athletics nor the arts.

Parrott credited the record-breaking numbers to Belhaven's ability to adapt to student needs while staying rooted in its mission. "Our enrollment growth is also the result of academically staying ahead of where the career market is headed," he said. "Whether it's launching cutting-edge programs like our AI



master's degree or ensuring our students are well-supported on campus, we've been intentional about adapting to career demands of the future, while never wavering in our Christ-centered mission."

Vice President for Enrollment and Marketing Suzanne Sullivan said the growth demonstrates Belhaven's strong reputation and community spirit. "The growth in enrollment is exciting—it shows that students, whether on campus or online, undergraduate or graduate, clearly recognize the value of a Belhaven education. With so many options available, we are truly honored when students choose to join our community. At a time when many schools have faced closures, achieving a 4% increase in total enrollment in the last five years is a blessing. It takes not only the enrollment and marketing teams, but the whole campus working together to be successful."

Out of her experiences, she launched Limitless, an initiative that helps foster children build emotional wellness and healthy connections. She also authored *Theodore: The Little Bear with Big Feelings*, a children's book distributed through CASA to help kids process their emotions.

"It was never about being seen—it was about being heard," she said.
"That's why pageantry spoke to me. It gave women a platform and a voice, a way to advocate for things that truly matter."

As Miss Mississippi, Jolly now serves as an ambassador for the state, traveling to schools, churches, and civic organizations to share her story. She also advocates for foster care reform and promotes her Limitless initiative.

"I want to use this year to amplify the message that every child is worthy of love, safety, and connection," she said. "This title isn't just a crown—it's a calling."

Jolly credits Belhaven University with shaping her both personally and professionally.

"Belhaven has given me more than an education—it's given me a community that believes in me," she said. "The scholarships I've received through the Miss Mississippi Organization have made it possible for me to attend Belhaven. The

support from faculty and classmates has strengthened both my faith and my confidence, preparing me to lead with grace and purpose."

She is pursuing a dual degree in dance and business

administration, the perfect match for a student who is both artist and entrepreneur. Alongside her studies, she owns Studio A Dance Company, a children's dance studio housed within Courthouse Gymnastics.

"Dance has always been a part of me, but so has leadership," she said. "I love that my studies at Belhaven allow me to explore both." When her year of service ends, Jolly plans to return to Belhaven a national nonprofit, publishing more children's books, and one day serving in public leadership.

"Long-term, I want to use my voice to create lasting change for the next generation," she said.

Belhaven University President Dr. Roger Parrott called Jolly's achievement a historic and inspiring moment for the campus community. "Anna Leah is a living testament to courage, creativity, and calling," Parrott said. "She will be a wonderful ambassador for both Mississippi and Belhaven University."

From Disney subtitles to the Miss Mississippi crown, Jolly's story is one of perseverance, faith, and the transformative power of community. As she steps into the limelight of being Miss Mississippi, she carries with her not just a crown, but the hopes of countless children who see themselves in her story.

Stared Legacy Of Sound Belhaven's lasting connection with the MSO blends tradition, mentorship, and innovation.

hen the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra (MSO) takes the stage, chances are strong that Belhaven University is also present—through its faculty, alumni, and students. The two institutions have been intertwined since the orchestra's founding, and their partnership continues to shape Mississippi's cultural and educational life today.

The connection between Belhaven and the MSO stretches back to the orchestra's earliest days in the mid-1940s. For decades, the orchestra kept its offices on the Belhaven campus, with rehearsals and performances held at the university. That foundation supported the orchestra until it eventually grew into a self-standing nonprofit organization.

"Belhaven had always been entwined with the history from the Mississippi Symphony," said MSO Music Director and Conductor Crafton Beck. "It has been quite natural, therefore, for a close relationship to develop."

Over the years, that relationship grew stronger as Belhaven invited MSO musicians to join its music faculty. Chief among them is violinist and professor Xie Song, whose teaching has shaped a generation of string players. Beck credits Song's influence with sustaining the symphony's high standards.

"Quite simply, without the numerous superb violinists who moved to Jackson specifically to study with Professor Song, I cannot imagine how the MSO would have managed to maintain such a high level of performance," Beck said. "An orchestra without a violin section is not an orchestra."

Today, the impact of Song's studio is unmistakable. In a recent rehearsal, Beck asked all violinists who had studied under Song to stand—nearly half the section rose.

"Mr. Song is a phenomenal teacher and violinist," said Dr. Stephen Sachs,

longtime Belhaven professor and MSO pianist. "The shared legacy between MSO and BU starts with him."

Sachs, reflecting on a group photo taken after a Bravo concert that captured Belhaven alumni, faculty, and students alongside Beck, called it "a dream come true" to see so many Belhaven-trained musicians central to the symphony's sound.

Another milestone in the Belhaven–MSO relationship came more than a decade ago, when Beck and Professor of Music Dr. Andrew Sauerwein launched the MSO Composers' Reading. The program, now directed by Sauerwein, invites composition students from Belhaven, Mississippi College, Jackson State University, and Mississippi University for Women to hear their works performed by the symphony.





"The MSO Composers Reading is designed to give students a rare opportunity to hear readings of the short orchestral works they have composed and discuss them with Crafton and the orchestra members, most of whom are music educators," Sauerwein said. "The experience and feedback students receive are tremendously valuable to their artistic growth and cultural understanding. It is not a competition or a marketplace; rather, composers and performers—and listeners—involved in the reading can give one another beautiful gifts of musical design, feedback, and insight."

Beck calls the reading "an extraordinary opportunity" that

preparing him for his career. For percussionist Daniel Jones, who also came through Belhaven's program, the bond was just as formative. Belhaven gave him the skills and the stage.

The collaboration benefits both the orchestra and the university. For Belhaven students, the opportunity to study with professional musicians and perform alongside them elevates their training. For the MSO, the relationship provides a steady stream of talented young players.

Beck believes the partnership also strengthens the musicians themselves. "Just about every musician in the MSO is a teacher," he said. "By working with younger generations, older professionals continue to grow. Younger generations remind us to adapt and discover new repertoire, new ways of thinking, and new ways to make music."

The connection between Belhaven and the MSO reaches beyond the campus and the concert hall. Events like the MSO's annual "Mozart by Candlelight" performance at Belhaven's Center for the Arts have become highlights of Jackson's cultural calendar.

Beck sees the partnership as vital not only for training musicians but also for enriching Mississippi's cultural landscape. "The many out-of-state and international students who choose to study at Belhaven represent an extraordinary mixing of experiences and cultures for us all," he said.

The legacy of partnership rests on excellence and commitment, Sachs said, and its continuation depends on both institutions staying strong.

From its beginnings nearly 80 years ago to today's shared stages and classrooms, the bond between Belhaven University and the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra remains a defining force in Mississippi's cultural life—ensuring the next generation of musicians will continue to thrive.

ATRICK ROBEY joins Belhaven as the Head Baseball Coach after 10 seasons at Madison Central High School, where he led the Jaguars to three state championships, most recently the 2025 MHSAA 7A title at Trustmark Park. In 2021, his team was named Baseball America's High School Team of the Year, and he was named National High School



Baseball Coaches Association Coach of the Year.

Robey also coached at Lafayette County and South Panola high schools and held assistant roles at Delta State and East Central Community College.

"I've followed and respected Patrick's work for years, both his track record with player development and his competitive success," said Vice President and Director of Athletics Scott Little.

Robey brings a reputation for cultivating both talent and character, emphasizing discipline, teamwork, and academic achievement alongside athletic success. Belhaven officials expect his leadership to strengthen the baseball program's competitive edge while fostering a supportive environment where student-athletes can grow on and off the field. His proven record of developing players at every level makes him a key addition to the university's athletics leadership team.



DSEPH DENDY joins the Belhaven Blazers as the new Head Men's Golf Coach. In addition to his role at the helm of the Blazers' golf program, Dendy will also serve as the department's Director of Game Day Operations.

Dendy joins the Blazers' staff from Hinds Community College, where he has served as a Volunteer Assistant Coach for the Eagles' golf team as well as an Assistant Golf Professional for the school's golf course facility since September 2024. Dendy helped the Hinds program to a trio of top-six finishes across the 2024-25 campaign.

"I am happy to welcome Joseph to Belhaven as our new Head Men's Golf Coach and Director of Game Day Operations," said Director of Athletics Scott Little. "His background and experience will serve us well in leading our young men and giving administrative direction to event hosting across our eighteen sports programs."

Prior to his time at Hinds, Dendy was an instructor at Clear Creek Golf Club in Bovina, Mississippi where he served as a swing coach for eight collegiate golfers and two playing professionals. He also spent time at Bay Pointe Golf Club in Brandon where he assisted with the club's junior camps.



University graduate, has been named the 2025 Collegiate Conference of the South (CCS) Woman of the Year, honoring her excellence in athletics, academics, leadership, and service. A four-year star for the Blazers, Jones becomes the second consecutive Belhaven student-athlete to receive the award, following Kennedy Carruth in 2024.

"It is truly a privilege to honor this year's CCS Man and Woman of the Year recipients. Their success both on the

field and in their communities sets a powerful example for others," said CCS Commissioner Beth Vansant.

A recent Belhaven graduate, Jones excelled in all areas of student-athlete life. She set single-season records in batting average (.519), slugging percentage (.939), and on-base percentage (.571) in 2025, also leading the league in slugging. Over her career, she ranked in

Belhaven's top five for home runs (34), RBIs (159), total bases (377), batting average (.397), runs (143), and hits (227). In 2024, she helped lead the Blazers to their first NCAA Division III Women's College World Series, finishing as national runner-up. Jones was named 2025 CCS Player of the Year, earned All-Region honors twice, was a 2022 NFCA All-American, and claimed 2022 Freshman of the Year.

Academically, Jones graduated summa cum laude, earning Academic All-American honors in 2025 and the

Matthew 20:28 Award for service and character. She made the Dean's and President's Lists and was active in the American Chemical Society, serving as both a member and officer.

Her service extended throughout the community,

"Ellie will be remembered in the record books as one of the best to ever play softball at Belhaven," said Head Coach Kevin Griffin. "Her accomplishments on the field speak for themselves, but I am more proud of who she is off the field."

Jones has begun her next chapter as she pursues a dentistry degree at the University of Alabama at Birmingham School of Dentistry.



MEN'S SOCCER: CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS & NCAA CONTENDERS

Belhaven Men's Soccer enjoyed a breakthrough 2024-25 campaign that rewrote program history. Projected as a solid contender, the Blazers instead surged into the spotlight with resilience and timely scoring. Forward Wesley Bloodworth paced the attack, adding 18 points to the overall Blazer season. Anchored by a disciplined defense and standout goalkeeping, Belhaven produced several dramatic wins that built confidence and energy on campus. Their momentum carried into the postseason, where the Blazers showcased composure and chemistry. The magical run peaked in the CCS Championship, as Belhaven shut out Covenant 2-0, capturing the first league title in school history and earning the program's inaugural NCAA Division III Tournament berth-a landmark achievement that set a new standard for the future.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL: RISING TO THE OCCASION

Women's Basketball enjoyed a standout season that exceeded preseason expectations. Picked just fifth in the CCS poll, the Blazers instead soared into contention. They finished 15-9 overall and an impressive 12-4 in conference play - the best league record in school history. Along the way they knocked off the league's top teams (Piedmont and Asbury) in thrilling home games, becoming only the third team to beat every conference opponent at least once during the regular season. Senior standouts powered the run. Ebony Gayden became just the 16th player in Belhaven women's history to reach 1,000 career points, hitting the milestone in the CCS quarterfinal victory over Huntingdon. Her offensive spark, and others, carried the Blazers to the CCS tournament final. Belhaven held its own for an early lead in the championship game but ultimately fell 64-51 to top-seeded Piedmont.

MEN'S BASKETBALL: PROGRAM RECORD HIGHS

The Blazers finished the regular season as CCS co-champions (11-1 conference) alongside Maryville, earning their first-ever CCS title share at the Division III level. Their 21-4 overall record was the program's best in 15 years, featuring a schoolrecord 16-game win streak from December through mid-February. The team led by Senior Jordan Marshall gained 395 points for the Blazers this season. By season's end the Blazers had secured a No. 2 seed and a bye in the conference tournament. In the semifinals, though, the magic finally paused. Belhaven fell 78-66 to No. 3 Huntingdon in a hard-fought game. Despite the loss, the 21–5 final mark represented one of the winningest seasons in program history, and the effort earned the Blazers consideration for an NCAA at-large bid. With Coach Boomer Roberts having joined the team as Head Coach, he is setting a new standard for success giving fans much anticipation for the upcoming season.



BASEBALL: A HISTORIC FIRST

The Belhaven Blazers made history in 2025 with a breakout baseball campaign. They finished with an impressive 34-15 overall record, the best winning percentage since joining NCAA Division III in 2016. The team earned its first-ever NCAA Regional appearance-sweeping through the Webster Regional by defeating Rhodes, nationally ranked Webster, and MSOE-and advanced all the way to the Super Regional round of the NCAA Division III Championship. With pitcher Kade May leading the charge, in their Super Regional matchup, the Blazers faced a tough No. 2 Denison squad. The team fell short, bringing their historic season to a close. Belhaven's 2025 season marked a major milestone, setting a new standard for excellence in program history. As the Blazers look ahead to building on this success, Coach Patrick Robey has joined as the new head baseball coach. Robey brings a strong reputation for leadership and player development to guide the program into its next chapter.

SOFTBALL: BLAZERS REACH NCAA TOURNAMENT

Belhaven Softball capped another historic season adding the 2025 season amongst the ranks of many recent successful years. With a 32-9 overall record and a 14-2 mark in Collegiate Conference of the South play, they captured the CCS Tournament championship and earned their fifth straight NCAA Tournament berth (blazers.belhaven.edu). The Blazers opened the NCAA Marshall Regional with a dominant run-rule victory before falling in the semifinals, closing one of the most successful seasons in program history. Senior first baseman Ellie Jones, who delivered one of the finest individual seasons ever for Belhaven softball. Jones shattered program records with a .519 batting average, .939 slugging percentage, and 13 home runs, earning recognition as a First Team NFCA All-American. Together, the 2025 Blazers and Jones set a new standard of excellence, giving Belhaven fans a season to remember.

TRACK AND FIELD: SPEED, STRENGTH, AND CHAMPIONSHIPS

Belhaven Track and Field built momentum throughout the 2024–25 campaign, producing championship performances across both men's and women's squads. On the men's side. **Neal Terry** claimed league titles in the high jump, long jump, and triple jump on his way to being named CCS Field Athlete of the Meet and Overall Athlete of the Year, while relay teams added crucial podium finishes to secure a third-place team standing. The women's team delivered its own fireworks, highlighted by Kimona Haynes, who swept the CCS sprint titles in the 100m, 200m, and 400m, while also starring on winning relays. Haynes earned the rare trifecta of Track Athlete of the Meet, Overall Athlete of the Meet. and Athlete of the Year, cementing her place among the conference's elite. With multiple All-Conference honors, record-setting times, and strong postseason results, the Blazers confirmed their rising status as a track and field powerhouse.



elhaven University is impacting Mississippi's teacher shortage with the launch of a fully online K-6 Elementary Teacher Education Preparation Program. This new option gives future educators across the state a flexible, high-quality path to the classroom without the need to attend on-campus classes.

Created in response to Mississippi's ongoing teacher shortage and rising demand for online learning, the program mirrors Belhaven's traditional on-campus offering and includes strong academic support and local field experience opportunities.

"Our goal is to remove barriers for individuals who feel called to teach but need a more accessible path," said Dr. David Hand, Belhaven University's Dean of the School of Education. "We are confident that this innovative online Teacher Preparation Program will play a vital role in addressing Mississippi's elementary teacher shortage. It also opens the door for individuals who are unable to attend a traditional campus-based program."

Belhaven University created the online program in response to Mississippi's teacher shortage, a new partnership with the state's community colleges, and the increasing demand for flexible, remote teacher preparation options among prospective educators across the state.

Hand points out that a degree in elementary education can open the door to a variety of rewarding careers in the field of education and beyond. Graduates of Belhaven's online bachelor's program are prepared to become licensed K-6 classroom teachers, shaping young minds in Mississippi's public and private schools.

Beyond traditional teaching roles, this degree also provides a strong foundation for careers such as reading specialists, curriculum coordinators, education consultants, instructional coaches, children's ministry, nonprofit education programs, and more.

The program is available exclusively to Mississippi residents. Belhaven will partner with local school districts, principals, and clinical educators to facilitate the required field and internship experiences in each candidate's community.

This new offering builds on the university's success with its online Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) Alternate Route program. According to Hand, it has already helped hundreds of teachers enter the profession. "Our experience and success with the MAT Alternate Route program have demonstrated the effectiveness of online education, and it serves as a supportive model for our new undergraduate offering," observed Hand.

ississippi's first fully online Master of Science in Applied Artificial Intelligence and a new Graduate Certificate in Applied Artificial Intelligence have been launched by Belhaven University, giving professionals flexible pathways to gain cutting-edge AI skills and leadership training. The initiative is supported in part by a \$389,600 grant from Governor Tate Reeves' Mississippi AI Talent Accelerator Program (MAI-TAP), underscoring the state's commitment to growing its AI workforce.

Both programs come at a pivotal moment as artificial intelligence reshapes industries and Mississippi makes historic investments in AI education and workforce development.

"Artificial intelligence is reshaping our world, and these programs couldn't come at a more pivotal time," said Dr. Brett

Andrews, dean of the School of Business at Belhaven University. "Instead of being replaced by AI, our graduates learn to lead with it—staying relevant, competitive, and confident in the future of work."

Master of Science in Applied Artificial Intelligence

The 10-course master's program prepares students for high-demand careers in technology, healthcare, finance, manufacturing, and beyond. Students gain hands-on experience with industry-standard tools such

as Python, TensorFlow, PyTorch, OpenCV, and scikit-learn. A capstone project allows them to apply these skills to real-world business challenges.

Graduates will be equipped for careers including AI specialist, machine learning engineer, natural language processing engineer, and business intelligence analyst. The program welcomes students from diverse backgrounds such as business, computer science, engineering, and data analytics.

"As Mississippi makes landmark investments—over \$37 million in AI education grants, an NVIDIA partnership to train 10,000 residents, billions of dollars in data center construction, and targeted state policies—it's clear we're laying the foundation for the next generation of tech leaders," Andrews said.

Graduate Certificate in Applied Artificial Intelligence

The four-course, 12-credit graduate certificate provides a fast-track option for professionals who want to strengthen their resumes with an AI credential but may not have a programming background. Courses apply directly toward Belhaven's master's degrees in Applied Artificial Intelligence

> and Data Science, giving students the flexibility to continue their education.

Students learn how to integrate generative AI into daily workflows, manage organizational transformation, and evaluate the ethical impact of AI adoption. Graduates position themselves as leaders guiding teams through technological change while demonstrating responsible AI leadership.



Jarvis, from Pelham, Alabama, believed he was in the final round of interviews when Thomas appeared on screen with good news. "I was blown away – it was quite the ambush," said Jarvis. "I was expecting an interview and

was worried. I couldn't be more relieved when Angie told me I won. It was depending on the scholarship because my family can't afford most major colleges. I'm just so thankful. This scholarship is a true blessing!"

Thomas responded,
"I have to say, I was
that student too. My
family couldn't afford much, and we
struggled a lot, even during my time
at Belhaven. It's truly an honor to
know that this need has been met
for you."

Jarvis was selected because of his creative writing submissions. His work was reviewed by both Thomas and Smith. Thomas said, "I read your

submission, and it was wonderful! I have no doubt that the creative writing department is gaining a wonderful student. I can't wait to see what you do."

Smith highlighted his writing and said, "Owen is exactly the kind of writer we want in the BFA program. His

stories—where setting, situation, and character are unique and intertwined—are a testament to a writer who has accomplished much already and who holds much promise for the future."

The day-long performance drew an enthusiastic crowd and showcased ballet, jazz, modern, hip-hop, and tap by Open Sky Arts Collective (Dallas), Ad Deum Dance (Houston), Enoch Contemporary Ballet (Athens, TN), Glorify Performing Arts (PA), Ballet Magnificat! (Jackson), Belhaven University, and others. Audience

members described the event as both entertaining and deeply moving, with artists using dance to communicate messages of hope and encouragement.

The conference also included master classes, an industry expo, auditions, networking, and inspirational sessions, offering dancers the chance to refine their craft while connecting with peers and professionals. BELHAVEN ALUMS DEBUT KIDNEY DONATION DOCUMENTARY

Belhaven alums Ashley and R.D. Chisholm ('14) are using storytelling to save lives with their newly-released documentary *Clear the List*.



After Ashley received a life-saving kidney transplant in 2019, the couple founded Pioneer Productions and turned their personal journey into a broader mission: to shine a light on the urgent need for living kidney donors in Mississippi.

Through a deeply personal and faith-driven lens, *Clear the List* captures the raw and moving stories behind a historic 14-person kidney exchange at the University of Mississippi Medical Center—the largest living donor chain in the state's history. With a minimalist crew and an extraordinary level of trust, the Chisholms were granted rare access into hospital rooms, prayer circles, and the hearts of patients, families, and medical staff alike.

Premiering to a sold-out crowd in Jackson, the film is already sparking change. *Clear the List* doesn't just

document—it advocates. By highlighting disparities in access, especially in Black communities, the Chisholms are helping to "clear the list" of those



waiting for life-saving transplants.

More than a film, it's a call to action rooted in service, faith, and the belief that every story has the power to save a life.

ALUM IJANEE NETTER ACCEPTED TO PRESTIGIOUS TIN HOUSE

Belhaven University is proud to announce that recent graduate Ijanee Netter ('25) has been accepted into the highly-selective Tin House Summer Workshop for Fiction, one of the most prestigious writing programs in the country.

The workshop, which accepts only about 10 percent of applicants (roughly 140 out of 1,400), is by invitation only. Writers must submit samples of their work as part of the competitive application process.

Netter, who earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts in Creative Writing at Belhaven, has also been waitlisted for the New York University graduate program in creative writing and is currently awaiting decisions from several other top graduate schools.

Dr. Randall Smith, Chair of the Creative Writing Department at Belhaven, praised Netter's talent and promise as a writer. "She is one of the most gifted writers I have taught in the BFA in Creative Writing at Belhaven University over the past twenty-five years," said Smith. "In terms of her ability to



craft memorable characters and compelling plot structures, Ijanee reminds me of one of our most famous graduates, Angie Thomas." Smith added, "Ijanee also creates lyrical prose in her fiction (akin to the work of Jesmyn Ward) which complements her already fantastic, urgent, and believable characters set on inevitable arcs toward crisis and change. Ijanee does all of this in a seemingly effortless way. I don't think she really knows how gifted she is as a writer, but that innocence and her natural humility also make her very teachable."

In addition, Netter is a bright scholar, consummate reader, and dedicated member of the writing community at large. During the fall of 2023, Netter attended the Fiftieth Anniversary Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival at Jackson State University where she listened to and learned from writers such as Alice Walker, Sonia Sanchez, Jesmyn Ward, and Angie Thomas, among others.

Belhaven University celebrates Netter's accomplishments and looks forward to her continued success as a writer and scholar.

U.S. MINT MEDAL FOR NATION'S 250" ANNIVERSARY

and supporting local economies.

"Mississippi is a great friend to business," Gabriel says. "Where it might take two years to open an ice cream shop in California, here local leadership bends over backwards to help. Everything is done with an eye on families, and business relationships are treated like family, too."

Through Pracon and his ventures, Gabriel Prado is proving Mississippi's growth story is just beginning.





Dr. Verne Kennedy, Former President of Belhaven University

Dr. Verne Kennedy, former president and longtime trustee, entered the LORD's presence on February 28, 2025, at the age of 83. A proud graduate of Belhaven University in 1963, he went on to earn his M.A. and Ph.D. from Louisiana State University before returning to Belhaven



as president in 1978. At just 36 years old, he led the University for eight years, leaving an indelible mark through his vision, leadership, and commitment to Christian higher education. Most significantly, he established Belhaven's enduring emphasis on a Christian Worldview—a foundation that continues to define the University today.

Known for his love of photography and outdoor adventure, Dr. Kennedy combined intellect with warmth, inspiring students, faculty, and alumni alike. His dedication to education and mentorship extended far beyond his presidency, continuing throughout his service as a trustee and friend to the Belhaven community. In recognition of his legacy, the University dedicated the Dr. Verne Kennedy Plaza in 2018, a cherished space at the heart of campus featuring Belhaven's signature fountain.

Alumni and friends gathered with his wife, Martie, and the Kennedy family on March 9, 2025, at the Dr. Verne Kennedy Plaza to honor and celebrate his remarkable life, sharing memories and the lasting impact he had on the Belhaven community.

Natalie Black, a vibrant and talented sophomore track and field athlete at Belhaven University, passed away unexpectedly on March 1, 2025, at the age of 19. A native of Terry, Mississippi, Natalie was known for her infectious smile, boundless energy, and unwavering positivity. She was a standout in the triple jump having achieved a personal best of 11.01 meters the Mississippi College Spring Cleaning Classic, where she earned second place.



A special chapel service was held for the campus to talk about Natalie's sudden passing, and a candlelight vigil at the Belhaven track gathered teammates, family, and friends to celebrate her life and legacy.
